

The Gilded Frame Book Reading

May 10 at 7 PM — Brick Academy



The Historical Society is hosting a book reading and signing by Peter Gilbertson, author of *The Gilded Frame*, the recently published "mystery in history" set in the Somerset Hills of 110 years ago.

Gilbertson grew up in the shadow of Bernardsville's "Mine Mountain." He and his friends often rode their bikes up and over the mountain to Mendham and back, oblivious to the magnificence that was hidden behind stone walls and vast lawns. It wasn't until his college days, while volunteering as a docent for the first Mansion in May at the original Upton Pyne mansion, that he became enthralled, and over the succeeding decades tried to learn as much about the Bernardsville Mountain Colony.

The Gilded Frame—Gilbertson's first book—is a historical mystery set in the area where wealthy, famous, and powerful New Yorkers established country estates around the turn of the twentieth century. The story opens at a 1985 elegant dinner party with Jackie Onassis, then reaches back in time to 1912 and a mysterious death.

The Gilded Frame not only resolves the mystery, but very effectively and believably transports the reader into the cultural landscape of the Somerset Hills of a century ago. Book reading details at www.thssh.org.

Sky Farm Nudist Resort - 90 Years au Naturel

In the 1930s, a group of pioneering nudist enthusiasts, under the guidance of Kurt Barthel, a German immigrant, purchased a 36 acre property in the remote Watchung Mountains of central New Jersey to set up a "summer camp" for families.

More than 90 years later, they are still there, tucked away in what is now the affluent suburban enclave of Bernards Township. Sky Farm is today the nation's oldest naturist community.



For the first time in the resort's long history Sky Farm will conduct an exclusive off-site presentation for THSSH members at the Brick Academy. As a member benefit, you are welcome to bring a guest.

Bernardsville 'Walking Museum'

A self-guided "Walking Museum" tour, proposed by Downtown Bernardsville, the non-profit organization that is working to revitalize the business district, is being developed.

Detailed signs or "panels" would be installed at ten or more historic locations highlighting the sites with pictures and information. A Quick Response Code (QRC) will link to a website to provide digital audio and detailed interesting stories. The onsite program would include a larger "central marker" that includes a map of the participating sites.

Sites that are being considered include, the Train Station, the Olcott School Building, the Bernards Inn, The Station Restaurant, St. Bernard's Church, the Bernardsville Methodist Church, Ristorante, the Wells Fargo Bank clock and the Bernardsville Cinema 3 movie theater.

CHARTER DAY

Saturday - May 20

This year's street fair, along South Finley Avenue in Basking Ridge on Saturday, May 20 from 12PM to 6PM, commemorates the 263rd anniversary of the granting of a Charter by King George II of England, establishing Bernardston Township. The charter was in appreciation for the services of Sir Francis Bernard, who was Royal Governor of New Jersey from 1758-1760.

Today, the township comprises the four communities of Basking Ridge, Liberty Corner, Lyons, and West Millington.

The Historical Society will have a prominent presence by the Blue Café and will also welcome visitors to the Brick Academy on West Oak Street from Noon to 4PM. Both locations will highlight the nonprofit organization's mission, upcoming events, membership benefits, and volunteer opportunities.

The Far Hills 4-H Fair

Beginning in 1947, Far Hills became a center for the area's thriving agricultural community when it hosted the Somerset County 4-H Fair.

The 4-H movement in the United States began in the early 20th century as a youth development program of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Cooperative Extension System. By the early 1940s, local 4-H clubs were well established in Somerset County and held annual shows to showcase the work of participating boys and girls. For instance, in Bernards Township, the Willing Workers 4-H Club held a one-day fair on August 17, 1946 at the corner of Henry Street and Maple Avenue in Basking Ridge. Judges awarded prizes for livestock and garden products.¹ The next year, the Somerset County 4-H Council sponsored a county-wide show and chose Far Hills Fair Grounds as the location.

The 1947 show on August 15-16 featured livestock such as cattle, sheep, and goats, as well as displays for flower and vegetable growing, canning, and sewing. Bob Senkbeil and his Jersey cow from Liberty Corner won the grand championship.²

The next year, 36 Somerset County 4-H clubs participated in the fair which hosted a donkey ball game between county farmers and the county 4-H council.³ Other staples at the fair over the years were exhibits of farm machinery and the selection of a "4-H Fair Queen."

On its first day, about 3,000 persons visited the 1952 fair, which featured a five-breed, 80-animal dairy show.⁴ In 1955, the second day of the fair was disrupted by Hurricane Connie, which downed tents and flooded the fair grounds.⁵

The last 4-H fair held in Far Hills was August 23-24, 1961. That year the county bought the larger Dunn farm on Milltown Road in Bridgewater as parkland and subsequent fairs have been held there. In 2022, the fair resumed in Bridgewater after a two-year hiatus due to COVID-19. An estimated 60,000 people attended.⁶

SUMMER ARRANGEMENT


Union Line: 'Baskingridge to N. York'

As the summer season approaches today's travelers have various transportation options including land, water, and air.

A poster exhibited at the Brick Academy, dated July 20, 1841, details a horse drawn coach line leaving 'Baskingridge' at 6 AM, arriving in Elizabethport in time for the 11 AM steamboat to dock in New York at 12 Noon. A quick six hour trip! Inbound travel was scheduled for Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays with outbound travel on Tuesday, Thursdays and Saturdays.

The poster notes David Ayres as the coach driver. The Ayes family is documented as one of the founding families of our area. The history of the Basking Ridge Presbyterian Church notes: Shortly after the first Scotch-Irish farmers settled in Basking Ridge – about 1717 – they erected a log house of worship on the site of our present church. In 1731, John Ayers deeded to the trustees of this church one and a half acres "on or near the middle of which now stands a house built and intended for the exercising of religious worship in."

When steamboats were introduced on the nation's rivers, Robert Fulton's first steamboat launched on August 17, 1807, they were used primarily for passenger travel rather than the transportation of goods. Steam-powered ferries carried


passengers up and across the Hudson faster and less costly than prior flatboats, rafts, and keelboats. Once the interstate railroad system came along in the mid-19th century, steamboats became less utilitarian and more leisurely.

Over 350 children from five Bernards Township elementary schools visited the Brick Academy to participate in the Early American Schoolhouse program administered by a team of former school teachers.

Additionally, three Ridge High School students provided volunteer hours and contributed to the Society's mission as valued members of our Young Historians Program.

With the school curricula in mind, visiting students role-play by arriving at the Brick Academy with provided 'school supplies' such as water buckets, fire logs for the potbelly stove, study books, and writing slates. (*right photo*)
